




WELCOME TO FOOD AND AGRICULTURE ORGANIZATION

Access to water has been a fundamental right since 2010. Indeed, water is an essential resource for all human beings, and should be accessible to all under the best possible conditions, in terms of both quantity and quality.

Yet today, on an international scale, the distribution of this resource is highly unequal, and its accessibility is sometimes compromised. That's why the FAO committee initially set out to find solutions to this issue:

"What international framework can be put in place regarding the sharing of water between states at the regional scale?"
Since 2020, the percentage of malnourished people in the world has once again risen.

Access to qualitative and quantitative food is vital for human beings and is considered an international right by the UN. Some people are more vulnerable than others (indigenous peoples, etc.), and all food security issues are exacerbated by rising climate change. It is imperative to put in place effective agricultural and research models to find seeds adapted to the rigors of the climate. Changes need to be made to agri-food systems. In the words of David Beasley, Executive Director of the World Food Programme, "We must act now to avert the catastrophe that is looming". The major challenge of the issue "How to promote an efficient agricultural and research-



focused model to ensure food security on an international scale?" is therefore to come up with sustainable solutions that can be implemented rapidly.

Because of the possibilities it opens up for new solutions, it is necessary to invest in research, as many groups such as Limagrain are doing. Mr. PEARSON pointed out that, despite the uncertainty of such investments, they are essential to understanding and solving the problems we face. Our sincere thanks go to Mr. PEARSON, who made us aware of the need for companies to contribute to finding sustainable solutions.











WELCOME TO HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR REFUGEES

We began by discussing the issue of "How to guarantee refugees access to job and financial services?" After fleeing war and persecution, the opportunity to work and earn a living enables refugees to rebuild their lives in dignity and meet the basic needs of their families. They all want to regain their independence and contribute to society. While in the texts 75% of refugees should have access to work, in practice 62% of refugees live in countries where access to legal employment is restricted. Refugees face high unemployment rates, lack access to education and

training, and lack access to financial services.

Delegates then worked on the protection of refugee children, who account for 40% of the world's refugees and displaced persons: "How can the protection of refugee children be ensured?"

In 2022, 36.5 million children were forcibly displaced by war and persecution. They are at risk of various forms of abuse, violence and trafficking, being separated from their guardians and recruited by armed groups. This situation has serious consequences for their health, education and



psychological well-being. Added to this is the problem of the 1.5 million stateless children born to non-status refugee parents, who face difficulties in registering their birth and obtaining care.

In Africa, for example, through educational programs, the UN enables millions of children in extremely precarious situations to eat at least once a day and study.

Through anecdotes as dramatic as they were optimistic, Fabienne POMPEY helped us to understand the reality of the figures we are studying. Our heartfelt thanks go to her for such a lively and enriching talk.











WELCOME TO WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION

This year's international ClerMUN conference was once again the subject of lively debates. This was particularly true of the WHO committee, where discussions were held in English. Our 21 delegates quickly grasped the stakes and interests of our two issues:

- How can an efficient medication and care access system be put in place on a global scale?
- How can an international socialsecurity system concerning health and work-related injuries be put in place?

People's health was therefore at the heart of our debates, and our delegates put forward some excellent resolutions. They came up with solutions to the problems of landlocked populations (particularly in the Sahel) and the cost of medicines, which for 800 million people accounts for 15% of annual personal expenses (as a reminder, by 2024 less than a billion people will have satisfactory medical coverage). It was also with a view to preventing new pandemics and reducing inequalities in access to healthcare that our delegates succeeded in setting up a global social



security system aimed at establishing a common basis for free healthcare and its equitable distribution among all. While this is an encouraging start, there is still a long way to go before we achieve Sustainable Development Goals 3 and 10, which were discussed by our committee






Our expert: Mr. RESNIKOFF

WELCOME TO SECURITY COUNCIL

Our Ist issue was "How can lasting peace and prosperity for populations in Libya be ensured?"

Libya has been facing an unprecedented humanitarian and security crisis since 2011. The country is divided into two rival governments, each controlling part of the territory. The security situation is unstable, with frequent fighting between the various militias. Living conditions for Libyans have deteriorated sharply, with increasing poverty, malnutrition and disease. During the conference, our MUNers strove to get to the root of the problem in order to find viable multilateral solutions that would enable a return to peace, so that civilians could once again

live a decent life. The 2nd issue was: "What legal framework can be put in place to ensure the export of agricultural goods from wartorn countries?".

The Russian invasion of Ukraine on February 24, 2022 highlighted the vulnerability of agricultural value chains to the conflicts ravaging certain regions. Global inflation in agricultural prices - and seeds prices in particular - and the resulting supply difficulties have put many populations, mainly in developing countries, under severe pressure.

Russia's non-renewal of the Black Sea Grain Initiative in July 2023 has rekindled the uncertainties that the conflict poses for global food security.

The challenges are manifold, ranging from the creation of storage infrastructures and secure transport corridors to the protection of farmers and their production capacities. In addition to formulating recommendations for the development of a legally binding framework for the export of agri-food products from countries at war, the Security Council also

discussed the possibility of deploying specific action mechanisms, in line with the



prerogatives conferred on it by the UN Charter, such as a Commission of Inquiry into the destruction of agricultural infrastructures and the Kakhovka dam in Ukraine.

It's hard to explain what ClerMUN brings us, but the words "caring", "sharing", and "professionalism" come to mind first. More than an academic experience, ClerMUN is a life experience. The debates, often impassioned, always fascinating, took place in a studious atmosphere, reflecting the importance of the issues we had to work on.



We were honored to welcome Mr Alain LE ROY, who presented aspects of the Libyan conflict through his experience as UN Under-Secretary-General in charge of Peacekeeping Operations. He then answered numerous questions from our delegates, enabling them to find out more about the life of an ambassador, as well as the Libyan conflict, which is at the heart of our second issue. Finally, he encouraged us to submit to him proposals for possible changes to the UN, so that he could share them, next September, at the Sommet de l'Avenir. We are well aware of how fortunate we have been to be able to talk with a man of such experience and openness. We would like to thank him sincerely for the attention he has given us.





















WELCOME TO THE INTERNATIONAL COURT OF JUSTICE

We first dealt with a case between Russia and China. concerning the border island of Bolshoi Ussouriski which the latter has put claims on since August 2023 (but whose historical ownership dates back several centuries). Russia intended to enforce a bilateral treaty from 2004 for this strategic island allowing access to the Sea of Japan, but also close to the Russian city of Khabarovsk. Giving the island to Russia, we however granted damages to China for this loss of a historic Chinese territory stolen in 1929 by the USSR. We then dealt with a request from Turkey regarding the free exploitation of resources in the Aegean Sea (oil, fish)

against Greece which wanted to retain the EEZ allocated to it by the Montego Bay Convention of 1982. If Turkey highlighted the inflationary crisis hitting its economy and the principle of continental shelf, its non-signature of the Convention did not allow it to take advantage of it only when favorable. The Court therefore refused the extension of the Turkish EEZ but maintained its limit in the Aegean Sea at 6 nautical miles (compared to 12 requested by Greece) and the demilitarization of islands bordering Turkey as stipulated by the treaty of Paris of 1947 signed by Greece.



Both verdicts were difficult to determine due to the great seriousness, relevance, persuasion skills and active participation of the different lawyers (especially Louise Massoneau and Estelle Force).



Our best delegates are Louise MASSONEAU, party representative, and Estelle FORCE, lawyer.



This first ICJ implementation was successfully carried out, the result of months of hard work with Mr. Vendryes and a great experience. This unique committee focused on solving issues between states. Witnesses, representatives and lawyers were debating.

It was new for us, procedures were a bit different than other committees, but the participants exceeded our expectations.

Participating in this committee was fulfilling, exciting and its principles likely to help our future careers.





Our expert: Mr. LEROI

He was a remarkable person who knew how to tell us his life story in an exciting way, always being humble when explaining his profession and future perspective as well as personal experience. He did not elaborate too much on his career which he considered too classic to truly interest us. He showed himself to be wonderful and open when explaining to us this new element of the magistrate's profession that is the diplomatic magistrate. It was a real pleasure to meet him and we hope to see him again at next year's conference and despite what he calls his "poor English accent", we hope to hear from him a magnificent speech during the opening ceremony.
